Letter from the Chairman

January 25, 2008

Dear Friends,

As I complete my first year as Chairman, I reflect on the history of this outstanding organization and our meager beginnings. As most of you probably know, the founding members of the foundation are Elevator World, NAEC, NEII and NAESAI. They held us together on a month-to-month basis. They worked very hard in developing our exceptional programs and the structure of this foundation. I'm not sure if they realize it, but those selfless volunteers did one helluva job - especially with the Safe-T Rider program! If you have not seen Safe-T Rider presented before, you will get that opportunity at the Annual Meeting. The program remains current and the kids love it!

Under our previous Chairman Doug Witham, the foundation enjoyed our finest hour financially. We raised more money than we spent, and, for the first time ever, we actually had a surplus. It makes me very proud to report that we have continued that course and look to have a surplus this year as well.

Mike Corbo of Mitsubishi Electric and Electronics, USA, our 2007 campaign chairman, also did an outstanding job. Under his fine leadership, the campaign exceeded the goal by raising almost \$301,000. This is largely due to major contributors such as National Elevator Industry, Schindler, ThyssenKrupp, KONE, NAEC, NAESA International and NAVTP New York Region. Thirty contributors increased their donation and we welcomed 17 new contributors - Thanks again, Mike. Robert DeFrancesco - "Bobby D," our current campaign chairman, has picked up right where Mike left off with \$82,125 to date (Jan 25, 2008), an increase from last year at this time by \$36,990. A total of 22 members have increased their support and we have welcomed three new contributors.

The Foundation would not be enjoying our financial stability without the tremendous support from the industry, including the hard work of many volunteers who run fundraisers for the foundation - standbys like the Pop/Joe golf outing, NAEC convention party and the NAVTP New York dinner cruise and some new ones like the Chicago dinner cruise, the CECA fundraiser and the Canadian NAESA regional fundraiser. We also benefit from raffles and 50/50s held at the various workshops, such as NAESA Eastern, Western and Central Regionals, the Elevator Industry Group of Southern California and the Chicago Elevator Association.

The effectiveness and professionalism of the staff continues: Barbara continues to manage an efficient, organized and thorough team. Laurie continues to get the Safe-T Rider program out - we raised that goal to 500,000 kids this year and we are well on our way to reaching that goal. Ashley Rains joined the staff in September as Public Relations Director, and has not missed a beat.

I feel the foundation is at a crossroads of sorts. We have enjoyed financial stability long enough to believe that it is for real. The 2008 Annual Meeting is important, so important to the future of the foundation we hired a facilitator to help us determine, with input from the industry, the direction that we can best utilize our resources.

It is an exciting time for the foundation, one where we get to map out our near future and I thank you for being a part of it!

EESF History

In 1988, the National Association of Elevator Safety Authorities (NAESA) established a committee to investigate the possibility of forming a Foundation to educate the public, particularly children, on how to safely ride elevators and escalators.

The founding organizations, National Elevator Industry, Inc. (NEII), National Association of Elevator Contractors (NAEC), NAESA International and Elevator World committed to provide sufficient funds to establish the first program. In 1989, the Elevator/Escalator Safety Council was organized. The group researched the availability of government grants to help fund the program, engaged a noted specialist in children's education for advice, and reviewed numerous programs directed toward changing children's behavior, such as Smokey the Bear.

It took two years to develop the first program, Safe-T Rider©. During the first year when the program was field tested, it included a pre-test and a post-test to effectively evaluate the efficacy of the program. During these two years, the organization also became a full-fledged 501(c)(3) non-profit foundation so all contributions would be tax-deductible.

Since the introduction of Safe-T Rider and with the help of countless volunteers, the program has been sent to over 4 million children, teachers and parents. Each year, the Foundation has been able to solicit sufficient donations to increase the number of school districts receiving Safe-T Rider©. The materials are free of charge to any public or private school (second graders) wishing to participate.

In 1996, in conjunction with the National Safety Council (NSC), the Foundation began research on developing a new program, A Safe Ride®, to instruct adults, particularly senior citizens, on the safe use of elevators and escalators. Senior citizens are another at risk group for avoidable accidents when riding on elevators and escalators.

The A Safe Ride program was introduced at the 1997 Building Owners & Managers Association (BOMA) convention. Sixteen elevator companies participated in that convention and each company distributed free copies of the A Safe Ride video to valued customers. Through the generosity of many elevator companies, the Foundation's A Safe Ride® Program for Seniors is provided free of charge to Area Agencies on Aging and Senior Citizen Centers in the United States and Canada.

Three national associations, NAEC, NAESA and the Canadian Elevator Contractors Association (CECA) purchased and distributed copies of the A Safe Ride video to their membership. The majority of elevator manufacturers have also purchased the video in quantity to distribute to their various offices. It is the Foundation's wish that every senior citizen and every building manager and owner will eventually see the A Safe Ride video. Also, the National Safety Council distributed copies of the new program to all of their offices throughout the United States.

Available online are both the Safe-T Rider and A Safe Ride interactive programs. These programs were developed in direct correlation to the hard copy versions available to schools and senior citizen facilities. Now those who use the internet can educate their children online; and seniors can view the program on their home computers. Visit www.SafeTRider.org and www.ASafeRide.org to view the programs.

The Chairman of the Board of Elevator World, who has been a supporter of Foundation efforts, has contributed funds for future program development which can be used as matched by the industry. Presently on the drawing board are plans for printed materials that can be used with A Safe Ride to educate the general public, and a new video with printed materials addressing the special needs of people with disabilities. In addition, the Foundation is developing a DVD which will include all its programs and accompanying materials.

In summary, EESF has developed an assortment of safety programs to educate a wide range of riders of the equipment the elevator industry manufacturers, sells, installs, repairs and maintains.

Young children are most often involved in avoidable accidents. The Safe-T Rider program educates children and their parents on the safe use of elevators, escalators and moving walks. The program is easy to teach and fun to learn.

The Safe-T Rider program includes an 8 minute video which introduces Safe-T Rider, who guides the children through the transportation systems in a shopping mall using rap music and a magic show. Safe-T Rider's song repeats the industry developed safety rules. Also included in the program kit are a classroom poster, teacher's guide, student activity books, stickers, tests, certificates and parent information. A Safe-T Rider costume is also available that can be used to enhance any program presentation.

In an attempt to keep the Safe-T Rider program a viable tool, the Foundation requests response forms from parents and teachers who have children participating in the program.

EESF received numerous positive responses in the 2006-07 school year: 164 responses were from parents and 74 were from teachers.

A Safe Ride Program

2007 Adults Reached: 4,017 – United States and Canada

A Safe Ride is based on stand-alone video and printed materials. The video is aimed at the general public, while the safety workbooks and pamphlets are targeted at specific audiences, i.e., senior citizens, parents of young children, etc. Best results will be achieved when program materials are used in tandem.

The industry -- through the Foundation's programs -- hopes to reduce avoidable accidents by helping make the riding public more aware of safe and proper riding habits.

The concept for A Safe Ride began in 1995, when the Foundation commissioned Dr. Roma Hanks, a noted gerontologist at the University of South Alabama, to research literature to determine the best way to reach senior citizen riders. Concurrently, key members of the industry were asked to identify the safety messages such a program should address.

As the research was underway, the Foundation entered into an agreement with the National Safety Council (NSC) to jointly develop and produce the program, calling on the vast expertise of the NSC in program development.

The EESF/NSC team utilized Dr. Hanks' and industry expert reports as the basis for the program. The joint effort resulted in the rapid development of the facilitator's guide and a participant handbook along the lines the study suggested.

2007 National Elevator Escalator Safety Awareness Week

National Elevator Escalator Safety Awareness Week is celebrated each year to increase the public's awareness of the safe riding behavior while using its equipment. Safety Week is a promotion of public safety awareness for the industry's equipment. Everyone is invited to make this special week a huge success in cities throughout the United States and Canada. In 2007, Safety Week was celebrated November 11 – 17.

Safety Week provides a focal point for the industry, on a local and national level, to join together as individuals, companies and organizations and spread the word about public safety in the elevator and escalator industry. At the same time, Safety Week is an opportunity to celebrate the contributions made by the industry to the quality of life. Volunteers reach millions of riders with important safety messages in many locations during this celebration. It is celebrated each year the second full week of November.

As part of the preparation and celebration, the Foundation sent a request to each state's Governor asking them to officially proclaim Safety Week in their state. The Foundation received an overwhelming response, with 16 states' Governors and 14 city's Mayors signing the proclamation. General Safety Rules

ESCALATORS

1. Step on and off quickly and carefully.
2. Hold the handrail.
3. Always stand and face forward. Never sit on steps.
4. Keep hands, feet and clothing clear of moving parts.
5. Always wear shoes on escalator. No loose clothing or shoelaces.
6. Passengers only. No strollers, carts or large packages.
7. Hold the hand of young children.
8. Do not touch the sides below the handrail.

ELEVATORS

1. Watch your step when entering or leaving the elevator.
2. If the elevator stops and doors don't open, push alarm button and wait for help.
3. Watch out for the elevator's closing doors, stand clear - don't stop with hands.
4. In case of fire, use stairs (not elevator).

MOVING WALKS

1. Always stand facing forward holding the handrail.
2. Don't put packages on the handrail.
3. Hold the hand of younger children.
4. Step on and off carefully.
5. Stand to the right, walk on the left.
